Why SEES Symposium?

Southeast Europe often occupies a peripheral position within academic discourse, even in universities that position it as a core area of focus. While such institutions may offer programs or courses dedicated to the region, these efforts often lack the interdisciplinary frameworks and structural support needed to fully empower students in their research. Too often, engagement with SEE is fragmented, shaped by the individual interests of faculty or isolated within narrowly defined disciplines, leaving students to navigate their work without adequate context or collaborative opportunities. Even in specialized programs, the absence of spaces for dialogue across disciplines can foster a sense of academic isolation. Yet, research thrives on interdisciplinarity, community, and collaboration. These are the values at the hearth of the SEES Symposium.
